RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. A Brome County Agricultural Society exhibitor fee entitles the holder to exhibit in all sectors of the fair.
2. All exhibitors paying the \$25 exhibitor fee will be entitled to admission as follows: one 4 day pass.
3. Persons intending to compete at Brome Fair must submit the **entry form** and **required funds** to the Brome County Agricultural Society office to the attention of the administration by **August 10th before 8 p.m.** The post mark will not be considered. Post dated cheques are not accepted. Any incomplete entry can be refused by the board of directors.
4. A \$10 administration fee will apply to any entry submitted after the deadline.
5. Exhibitor 4 day passes will no longer be mailed with entry tags before fair. Passes will be distributed when articles are brought in prior to fair. **An exhibitors complete failure to exhibit will result in forfeiture of their 4 day pass. NO REFUNDS**
6. Every exhibitor of the Society will be liable to take the following oath if required by any member of the Society: "I do solemnly swear that all animals and/or articles exhibited by me are either my own or made or acquired by me according to the rules of this Society, so help me God".
7. No article shall be entered for more than one premium in the same year, except for special prizes.
8. No competitor shall be entitled to more than one premium in the same class unless otherwise stated
9. Any member exhibiting an article for premium contrary to the rules of the Society will forfeit all prizes awarded him that year.
10. All articles entered for competition shall be visibly ticketed and numbered and no person shall in any way interfere with the judges in the execution of their duties.
11. All prize ribbons which have been awarded by the judges must be displayed during the fair. Any infraction of this rule will ensure forfeiture of any premium awarded.
12. Any member of the Society found guilty of loaning or otherwise giving use of a Society badge to another person, shall forfeit all premiums obtained by him during the year.

13. Any and all questions of dispute that may arise shall be referred to the president and administration of the Society.
14. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing, and it must be delivered to the president or the administration within three hours of the cause of protest. This must be accompanied by a deposit of \$30 in cash. If such protest is sustained, the deposit will be returned; if not, it will be forfeited to the Society.
15. The Society will not be liable for any bills or accounts for any prizes won that are not presented or sent to the administration within two months from the close of the year, 31st October, in which said accounts become due or said prizes won.
16. In the event of the Society having not enough funds to pay the prizes in full, the Directors reserve the right to deduct the necessary percentage.
17. All trophies must be returned to the fairgrounds office not later than August 10th, before 8:00 p.m. and must be engraved and cleaned, ready for display. Presentations will be made immediately after judging is completed.
18. **Brome County Agricultural Society Inc. membership** is due each year at the annual meeting. The next annual meeting will be Saturday, December 10th, 2018

1. Classes shall be open to all competitors, space permitting, with priority given to residents of Brome, Missisquoi and Shefford Counties.
2. Exhibits will be received Thursday before fair from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.
3. Judging will start Friday at 9:00am. Committee members only will be permitted in the judging area.
4. Winners of classes will be posted by Sunday 1:00 pm. Awarding of trophies will be done on Monday of fair at 3:30 pm.
5. Judges shall not be competitors in any class for which they are to award prizes.
6. Exhibits shall remain on display until 5:00 p.m. of the last day of fair.
7. Exhibitors are responsible to retrieve their items as of 6:00 p.m. on the Monday night of Fair. Any articles remaining in the horticultural building after 7:00 p.m. Monday evening become the property of the society.
8. The society is not responsible for any damage to, loss or theft of exhibits.
9. Children section is from 3 to 9 years of age, and Youth section is from 10 to 14 years of age. No entry fee required to enter, but a 4 day pass is available with a \$25 fee and your minimum of 3 exhibits.
10. All trophies must be returned to the fairgrounds office not later than August 10th, before 8:00 p.m. and must be engraved and cleaned, ready for display. If your trophy is not returned by entry date, your tags will not be sent to you. Tags will have to be picked up in person at the fair office.
11. Your bracelets will be given to you **ONLY** upon receiving your entries required at the Horticultural building on the Thursday night before fair. Complete failure to exhibit will result in forfeiture of your 4 day pass. **NO REFUNDS**
12. Exhibitors must supply their own plates for display.
