New Exhibitor Special 2022 only

In 2022 only, the exhibitor fee of \$25 will be waived for all new exhibitors or exhibitors that have not participated in the past 5 years (since 2016).

To qualify for this special, the exhibitor must show a minimum of 5 items. If less than 5 items are brought to fair, the \$25 exhibitor fee must be paid to receive a 4-day pass.

General Rules

1. A Brome Country Agricultural Society exhibitor fee entitles the holder to exhibit in all sectors of the fair.
2. All exhibitors paying the \$25 exhibitor fee will be entitled to admission as follows: one 4-day pass with parking (if space is available).
3. We reserve the right to charge a \$10 administration fee for any entry submitted after August 10th.
4. Persons intending to compete at Brome Fair must submit the **entry form, required funds, and insurance certificate (if applicable)**, to the

Brome County Agricultural Society office to the attention of the administration by **August 10th before 8 p.m.** The post mark will not be considered. Postdated cheques are not accepted. Any incomplete entry can be refused by the board of directors.

5. Your 4-day pass will be given to you when you bring your items on the Thursday before fair. **Complete failure to exhibit will result in forfeiture of your 4-day pass. NO REFUNDS.**
6. Every exhibitor of the Society will be liable to take the following oath if required by any member of the Society: "I do solemnly swear that all animals and/or articles exhibited by me are either my own or made or acquired by me according to the rules of this Society, so help me God".
7. No article or animal shall be entered for more than one premium in the same year, except for horse performance classes, special prizes or as provided for in herd and group classes.
8. No competitor shall be entitled to more than one premium in the same class unless otherwise stated.
9. Any member exhibiting an article for premium contrary to the rules of the Society will forfeit all prizes awarded him that year.
10. All animals and articles entered for competition shall be ticketed and numbered and no person shall in any way interfere with the judges in the execution of their duties.
11. All prize ribbons which have been awarded by the judges must be displayed during the fair. Any infraction of this rule will ensure forfeiture of any premium awarded.
12. Any member of the Society found guilty of loaning or otherwise giving use of a Society badge to another person, shall forfeit all premiums obtained by him during the year.
13. Any and all questions of dispute that may arise shall be referred to the president and administration of the Society.
14. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing, and it must be delivered to the president or the administration within three hours of the cause of protest. This must be accompanied by a deposit of \$30 in cash. If such protest is sustained, the deposit will be returned; if not, it will be forfeited to the Society.
15. The Society will not be liable for any invoices or accounts due, for any prizes won, that are not presented or sent to the administration within

two months from the close of the fiscal year, October 31st, in which said accounts become due or said prizes won.

16. In the event of the Society having not enough funds to pay the prizes in full, the Directors reserve the right to deduct the necessary percentage.
17. All trophies must remain on grounds and returned to the office Monday night of Brome Fair.
18. Brome County Agricultural Society membership is due each year at the annual meeting. The next annual meeting will be Saturday, December 3rd, 2022.
19. All prize cheques must be cashed by October 31st of the year they were written.
20. All prize cheques will be mailed out after fair.

Horticulture Rules

1. Classes shall be open to all competitors, space permitting, with priority given to residents of Brome, Missisquoi and Shefford Counties.
2. Exhibits will be received Thursday before fair from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.
3. Judging will start Friday at 9:00am. Committee members only will be permitted in the judging area.
4. Winners of classes will be posted by Sunday 1:00 pm. Awarding of trophies will be done on Monday of fair at 3:30 pm.
5. Judges shall not be competitors in any class for which they are to award prizes.
6. Exhibits shall remain on display until 5:00 p.m. of the last day of fair.

7. Exhibitors are responsible to retrieve their items as of 6:00 p.m. on the Monday night of Fair, NO VEHICLES PERMITTED ON SITE. Tuesday night pickups available, time to be confirmed.
8. The society is not responsible for any damage to, loss or theft of exhibits.
9. Children section is from 3 to 9 years of age, and Youth section is from 10 to 14 years of age. No entry fee required to enter, but a 4-day pass is available with a \$25 fee.
10. All trophies will remain in Horticulture building.
11. Your bracelets will be given to you ONLY upon receiving your entries at the Horticultural building, on the Thursday night before fair. Complete failure to exhibit will result in forfeiture of your 4-day pass. NO REFUNDS
12. Exhibitors must supply their own appropriately sized plates for display.
13. All sunflower classes will be measured from top of the soil to the top of the plant
14. ALL PRIZE CHECKS WILL BE MAILED OUT AFTER FAIR.
