## RULES AND REGULATIONS

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1. Brome Fair is organized by the Brome County Agricultural Society (the Society).
2. Brome County Agricultural Society membership of \$15 is due each year at the annual general meeting.
3. The Society shall not be responsible in any way for any animals/items lost or stolen on the fairgrounds. Nor shall it be responsible for any damage caused by an accident on the fairgrounds.
4. The Society reserves the right to change or amend any rules or regulations at any time, if deemed necessary.
5. Any member of the Society found guilty of loaning or otherwise giving use of a Society badge to another person, shall forfeit all premiums obtained by him during the year.
6. Smoking is strictly prohibited in all buildings on the fairgrounds.
7. No unauthorized motor vehicles are permitted to circulate on the fairgrounds during fair (ex: golf carts, cars, RTVs, tractors, etc.).
8. Unauthorized animals (dogs, cats, horse, etc.) are not permitted on the fairgrounds. EXCEPTION: Mira dogs; either working, in training or in foster families being socialized.
9. No Refunds are given on the purchase of admission to the fair.

### COMPETING

10. Persons intending to compete at Brome Fair must submit their complete entry forms with required documents/payments to the Brome County Agricultural Society (the Society) administration by **August 10<sup>th</sup>, 8 p.m.**
  - a. The post mark will not be considered.
  - b. Postdated cheques are not accepted.
  - c. Any incomplete entry can be refused.
  - d. If accepted, entries submitted after this deadline may be subject to a \$10 admin. fee.
11. Entries may only be submitted in through the following methods:
  - a. **Online:** WWW.ASSISTEXPO.COM/BROMEFAIR
  - b. **By mail:** With cheque payable to **BROME FAIR.**
  - c. **In person:** Payment can be made by debit, Visa, MasterCard, cheque, or cash.

12. All exhibitors must pay a Brome County Agricultural Society **membership fee of \$15** for the following year to exhibit. This entitles the holder to exhibit in all sectors of the fair.
13. **All animal exhibitors** (cattle, sheep, goats, horses) must have **valid liability insurance coverage** (minimum \$2,000,000) that includes their participation in Brome Fair competitions with their animal (s). A proof of this coverage, **in their name**, must be submitted with entry forms.
14. A Parental Consent form must be submitted for all minors competing in Horse classes.
15. A proof of age (copy of Medicare card) may be required for exhibitors participating in classes with age restrictions.
16. The Society may refuse any entries at its own discretion.
17. No article or animal shall be entered for more than one premium in the same year, except for horse performance classes, special prizes or as provided for in herd and group classes.
18. No competitor shall be entitled to more than one premium per class unless otherwise stated.

19. Every exhibitor of the Society will be liable to take the following oath if required by any member of the Society: "I do solemnly swear that all animals and/or articles exhibited by me are either my own or made or acquired by me according to the rules of this Society, so help me God".
20. Any member exhibiting an article for premium contrary to the rules of the Society will forfeit all prizes awarded him that year.
21. Additional 4-day passes will be given as follows:
  - a. Cattle: one (1) per three (3) head
  - b. Horses: one (1) per three (3) head
  - c. Sheep: one (1) per flock of six (6)
  - d. Goats: one (1) per herd of six (6)

A max of 3 additional 4-day passes may be given per exhibitor.

22. Monday Departure Times:
  - a. Horses, Beef, Dairy: 3 p.m.
  - b. Goats, Sheep: 4 p.m.

Any exhibitor loading animals before, will forfeit any prize money, entry fees and will not be allowed to return for the following two (2) Fairs.

23. All animals and articles entered for competition shall be ticketed and numbered and no person shall in any way interfere with the judges in the execution of their duties.
24. All prize ribbons which have been awarded by the judges must be displayed during the fair. Any infraction of this rule will ensure forfeiture of any premium awarded.
25. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing, and it must be delivered to the president or the administration within three hours of the cause of protest. This must be accompanied by a deposit of \$30 in cash. If such protest is sustained, the deposit will be returned; if not, it will be forfeited to the Society.
26. The Society will not be liable for any bills or accounts for any prizes won that are not presented or sent to the administration within two months from the close of the year, 31st October, in which said accounts become due or said prizes won.
27. In the event of the Society having not enough funds to pay the prizes in full, the Directors reserve the right to deduct the necessary percentage.
28. All trophies must remain on grounds and returned to the office Monday night of Brome Fair.
29. All prize cheques must be cashed by October 31st of the current year.
30. All prize cheques will be mailed out after fair.

## DEFINITIONS

31. **Exhibit:**  
A unit of livestock qualifying for any entry into a class as specified in the classifications. All registered animals, whether owned by one person or by more than one person, individually or jointly, are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit on which they are maintained.
32. **Exhibitor:**  
Any breeder or firm which presents animals or articles for official placing by a judge at the time specified for judging.
33. **Breeding Unit:**  
In each classification where the same or common interests are involved in more than one breeding operation, such operations are considered as one **Breeding unit**. In all cases where there is any doubt that more than one breeding unit exists, the interpretation shall be that only one breeding unit exists. The responsibility of proof of separation of breeding units shall rest with the exhibitors.
34. **Purebred:**  
An animal of the breed as determined by the by-laws of an association authorized to register animals of that breed.

## JUDGES

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1. Judges shall be appointed by the officers and directors of the Society.
2. No person shall be allowed to act as judge who is in any way connected with the exhibit to be examined.
3. Judges are expected, in the execution of their duties, to be careful to act with the most rigid impartiality and to respect scheduled times and keep classes running accordingly.
4. Judges shall award premiums to the best manufactured article of its kind.
5. Judges shall, in awarding premiums on bulls, cows and heifers, have reference to the quality of such animals for improving stock and/or for dairy purposes.
6. Should there be one exhibit in a class or section; judges can use their own discretion as to awarding a premium. In all cases where they do not think the exhibit worthy, they can withhold the premium. Judges shall in no case award a prize unless they consider the exhibit worthy of such a premium.
7. Ownership of an exhibit shall not be in evidence during judging.
8. Any person not authorized to do so; conversing with the judge while on duty or otherwise interfering will forfeit any right he may have for a prize. It shall be the duty of the judge to report to the administration, on hand in the books, any infringement of the rule.
9. Upon discovery of any fraud, deception, dishonest practice, or misrepresentation regarding any exhibit, which may have influenced or been intended to influence the decision of the judge, the executive committee has the power to withhold payment of the prize awarded.
10. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with the judge in the performance of his duties, or shall afterwards, on the premises of the Society, use any abusive language to any judge in consequence of an award made by him, shall forfeit his right to any premium to which he might otherwise be entitled. Said person will also be excluded from exhibiting for one year thereafter. Judges are particularly requested to report any such breach of this rule.

## HORTICULTURE RULES

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1. Classes shall be open to all competitors, space permitting, with priority given to residents of Brome, Missisquoi and Shefford Counties.
2. Exhibits will be received Thursday before fair from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.
3. Exhibits shall remain on display until 5:00 p.m. of the last day of fair.
4. Judging will start Friday at 9:00am. Committee members only will be permitted in the judging area.
5. Winners of classes will be posted by Sunday 1:00 pm. Awarding of trophies will be done on Monday of fair at 3:30 pm.
6. Judges shall not be competitors in any class for which they are to award prizes.
7. Exhibitors are responsible to retrieve their items from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. sharp on the Monday night of Fair ONLY, NO VEHICLES PERMITTED ON SITE.
8. The society is not responsible for any damage to, loss or theft of exhibits.
9. All trophies will remain in Horticulture building.
10. Your 4-day pass will be given to you when you bring your items on the Thursday before fair. Failure to exhibit or to bring your minimum number of entries will result in forfeiture of your 4-day pass. NO REFUNDS.
11. Exhibitors must supply their own appropriately sized disposable plates for display.
12. All sunflower classes will be measured from top of the soil to the top of the plant.
13. ALL PRIZE CHECKS WILL BE MAILED OUT AFTER FAIR.
14. If you do not receive your entry tags a week before fair, please call us.
15. Exhibitor must not change numbers on tags.
16. The committee makes every effort to ensure the safety of exhibits but is not responsible for lost or damaged articles.
17. Prize money is listed by section, unless specified otherwise in a class.
18. Store bought items will be disqualified from competition.
19. **A minimum of 2 entries** total must be made per adult exhibitor (sections 410, 420, 430, 440)
